Mobile Phones and Smart Technology Policy

1. Purpose and Rationale

Cardiff Sixth Form College Cambridge recognises that mobile phones and smart technologies (including smartphones, smartwatches, tablets and internet-enabled devices) are an integral part of modern life and play a significant role in communication, learning and personal organisation.

However, the College also recognises that **students have unrestricted access to the internet via personal devices**, including through **4G**, **5G** and **VPNs**, which can bypass College filtering and monitoring systems. This presents safeguarding risks, particularly in relation to child-on-child abuse, online harassment, exposure to harmful content, and the creation or sharing of indecent images.

This policy sets out clear expectations for **safe**, **respectful** and **lawful** use of mobile **phones** and **smart** technology and supports the College's statutory safeguarding responsibilities under *Keeping Children Safe* in Education (KCSIE).

2. Scope

This policy applies to:

- All students
- All personal mobile phones and smart technologies
- Use on College premises, in boarding accommodation, during College activities, and off-site where behaviour impacts safeguarding, welfare or the reputation of the College

This policy should be read alongside the Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy, ICT Acceptable Use Policy, Anti-Bullying Policy, PSHE and RSE Policies, and the Good Behaviour and Sanctions Policy.

3. Key Safeguarding Principles

- Mobile phones and smart technologies can be used positively but must never be used to harm, intimidate, exploit or abuse others
- Online behaviour is subject to the same expectations and standards as face-to-face behaviour
- Safeguarding concerns may arise even when behaviour occurs off-site or outside College hours
- The College has a duty to act where student behaviour poses a risk to themselves or others

4. Risks Associated with Mobile and Smart Technology

The College recognises the following key risks:

- Unrestricted internet access via mobile data and VPNs
- Cyberbullying, harassment and intimidation
- Image-based abuse, including the creation, possession or sharing of indecent images
- Exposure to pornography, including violent or extreme material
- Online grooming, coercion or exploitation
- Sharing of harmful, extremist or hateful content
- Recording or photographing others without consent
- Misuse of generative AI, including deepfakes or impersonation

5. Expectations for Student Use

Students must:

- Use mobile phones and smart technologies safely, respectfully and lawfully
- Respect the privacy, dignity and consent of others
- Follow all College safeguarding and behaviour policies
- Comply with reasonable instructions from staff regarding device use
- Report concerns about harmful or abusive online behaviour

Students must **not**:

- Use devices to bully, harass, threaten or humiliate others
- Create, possess, request or share indecent images or videos of anyone under 18
- Access, view, store or distribute pornography or other harmful content
- Record audio, images or video of others without consent
- Use VPNs or other methods to deliberately bypass safeguards for harmful purposes
- Use technology to impersonate others or create deceptive content

6. Child-on-Child Abuse and Indecent Images

The College is clear that:

- Sharing nudes or semi-nudes of under-18s is illegal, even where there is perceived consent
- Such behaviour is treated as a safeguarding concern first, not solely a disciplinary matter
- Incidents will be managed in line with national guidance on Sharing Nudes and Semi-Nudes

Support will be provided to those affected, and appropriate action taken to reduce risk and prevent further harm.

7. Use During the College Day and in Boarding

- Mobile phone use may be restricted during lessons, assessments or specific College activities
- Boarding students must follow additional guidance set out in the Boarding Handbook
- Staff may require devices to be handed in temporarily where safeguarding, wellbeing or behaviour concerns arise

8. Monitoring, Searching and Confiscation

- The College may search, confiscate or retain devices where there is a safeguarding concern or breach of policy, in line with statutory guidance
- Devices may be examined where there is reason to believe they contain harmful or illegal material
- Parents/carers may be informed where appropriate
- Serious concerns may be referred to external agencies, including the Police or Children's Services

9. Reporting Concerns

Students are encouraged to report concerns about mobile phone or online behaviour to:

- Any trusted member of staff
- Houseparents or Head of Houses
- The Designated Safeguarding Lead (DSL) and Deputy DSL's

Reporting concerns is always the right thing to do and helps keep the College community safe.

10. Sanctions

Breaches of this policy may result in:

- Safeguarding intervention
- Temporary or permanent restriction of device use
- Behavioural sanctions under the Good Behaviour and Sanctions Policy
- Referral to external agencies where behaviour may be illegal

Sanctions will be proportionate and take account of safeguarding, welfare and individual circumstances.

11. Education and Support

The College provides ongoing education through PSHE, RSE, assemblies and pastoral provision on:

- Safe use of mobile technology
- Digital footprints and online reputation
- Consent, respect and healthy relationships online
- Sextortion, pornography and image-based abuse

12. Review

This policy is reviewed annually, or sooner if required due to changes in legislation, guidance or emerging risks.

This policy reflects the College's commitment to safeguarding, wellbeing and responsible digital citizenship.
